

This panel of pre-service teachers will provide participants with an overview of a handful of recently released young adult titles that may not have yet made it onto the busy teacher's bookshelf. With brief presentations on a selection of titles that will include award winners and a variety of voices, genres and topics, the presenters will discuss why these books might belong in your classroom and in your students' hands. If time permits, we will ask participants to share some of the texts that their students are currently engaged with.

Spaces of Joy for All Readers: Building Students' Comprehension through the Reading Rope, Questioning, and Gist Statements

Do you want to strengthen reading comprehension in your classroom? Looking for evidence-based strategies to guide a variety of readers in your class? In this session, educators will explore 3 evidence-based strategies that support the readings skills of students at all levels. First, we will explore Scarborough's reading rope to more deeply understand adolescent reading development. Second, we will analyze strategies for comprehension-building skills like questioning and summarizing to help striving readers make sense of the text, as well as a routine for building students' world and word knowledge. From the Institute of Education Science and What Works Clearinghouse, these evidence-based recommendations align with ELA and Social Studies Standards and will help students achieve greater success in reading comprehension.

GLSEN Arizona Working to Create Safe and Inclusive Schools and How You Can Too

Learn more about how GLSEN Arizona goes about empowering our community members to rise up for LGBTQ+ K-12 students, and how you can get involved in this important work. Our research shows that when LGBTQ+ students feel safer in schools, all students feel safer in schools; when the most marginalized are supported, we are all supported. Our presentation will give attendees a brief snapshot of the research GLSEN has conducted that demonstrates the 4 supports that help LGBTQ+ students feel safer in schools: student-led LGBTQ+ clubs, supportive educators, comprehensive policies, and inclusive curriculum. From there we'll break down the ways GLSEN Arizona is working to make our vision of safer schools for all a reality, and in that, attendees will begin to see how they can make an impact on our spectrum of engagement. The fight for our LGBTQ+ students, especially our trans, BIPOC, and disabled LGBTQ+ students, is more important now than ever.

The Solar Tomorrows project through ASU's Center for Science and the Imagination has created a new curriculum that uses contemporary, localized science fiction to help students imagine what a solar-powered future could look like. Learn how to walk students through the curriculum so that your students can create their own short stories and essays imagining a solar-powered future.

Incorporating students' lived experiences and cultures in ELA

Based on state ELA expectations for middle school students, this interactive class will address inclusion and the required standards for improving academic outcomes. The presentation will focus on incorporating lived experiences and cultural awareness to bridge required standards with improved academic planning to meet diverse learner needs. Dr. Monica Brown is the award-winning author of over thirty multicultural picture books for children, including Waiting for the Biblioburro, and Marisol McDonald Doesn't Match/Marisol McDonald no combina and the Lola Levine chapter book series. Her picture book biographies include Tito Puente: Mambo King/Tito Puente: Rey del mambo, Pablo Neruda: Poet of the People/Poeta del Pueblo, and Frida Kahlo and Her Animalitos. Monica's books have been featured in the NYTimes, The Washington Post, and on NPR's All Things Considered and have received multiple starred reviews. She is the recipient of two Américas Award and the Christopher Award, among others. Recent picture books by Monica include **Sharuko: El Arqueólogo Peruano/** Peruvian Archaeologist Julio C. Tello and Small Room, Big Dreams: The Journey of Julián and Joaquin Castro illustrated by Mirelle Ortega. 2022 brought the publication of She Persisted: Diana Taurasi and The Turquoise Room/El Cuarto Turquesa, illustrated by Adriana M.
